

Instructions to authors

European Geriatric Medicine is the official journal of the European Union Geriatric Medicine Society (EUGMS). This new journal aims to publish the highest quality material, both scientific and clinical, on all aspects of geriatrics.

To ensure a timely publication process, authors are requested to follow the instructions indicated in the guide for authors.

The journal is published bi-monthly in paper format and the articles are available online through *ScienceDirect*.

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Authors should submit their articles electronically to the Editor-in-Chief or to any one of the Associate Editors

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In the **title page**, it is essential to give full addresses for each author. Christian names will be given in full as it is important to identify each author for indexing purposes. Telephone and fax numbers with country and area code should be provided in addition to the e-mail address and the complete postal address. The corresponding author, who will be the contact at all stages of the publication, must be clearly indicated.

Abstracts

Original articles should include a 250-word abstract, outlining the study in its entirety, including purpose, subjects/
materials and methods, results, discussion and conclusion.

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Keywords

Three to six keywords should be chosen carefully, as they are used for indexing purposes. We recommend using terms from the Medical Subject Headings – MESH – in Pubmed

Abbreviations

Abbreviations should be defined in the text the first time they are used. After this point, they should be used exclusively and not interchangeably with their definition.

Organization of the manuscript

The journal publishes different manuscript types:

Research papers report results of fundamental research in the fields of the journal. They should not exceed 2500 words of text plus 3 tables and figures and 30 references. They should include structured abstracts

Research Letters are shorter papers about new findings or concepts: 1500 words of text plus references, but no abstract

Review papers are welcome. Either they follow an invitation from the Editor-in-Chief, or they should present a synthetic approach to recent research data and hypotheses. They should not exceed 3000 words of text, a structured abstract of 250 words and 30 references

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Case reports which present a clinical interest, should not exceed 600 words of text, with a short abstract of 50 words and 15 references

Letters to the Editor are processed rapidly. Therefore these should not exceed 500 words, with 10 references

Figures/illustrations

Figures should be completely and consistently lettered, the size of the lettering being in scale with the size of the illustration, taking into account possible reduction in size for printing purposes. The figures and illustrations should be numbered in Arabic numerals according to their sequence in the text (i.e., fig1.gif, fig2.gif, etc.).

All figures must be cited in the text.

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All tables must be titled and numbered consecutively with Arabic numerals. All tables must be cited in the text.

Only a minimum number of horizontal lines should be used.

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Figures and tables should not exceed the equivalent of two journal pages.

References

References are in Vancouver format (International Committee of Medical Journal Editors. Uniform Requirements for

Manuscripts Submitted to Biomedical Journals. Fifth Edition. N Engl J Med 1997;336:309–16)

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Author's names and initials, full title of cited article, title of journal in which the article appeared (abbreviated), year of publication, volume of the journal, and finally the pagination, first and last pages should be included.

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Abbreviate all journal titles according to the *Index Medicus*

Page numbers should be abbreviated, i.e. 394–8
