All abbreviations (other than those for units of measure) should be spelled out the first time they are used anywhere in the manuscript. Idiosyncratic abbreviations should not be used.

Original research:

Abstract no longer than 350 words, structured as follows: Background, Methods, Results, Conclusions; keywords; the text should not exceed 4 500 words (tables, figures and references not included), except specific necessity, with the following structure: Introduction, Material/Patients and Methods, Results, Discussion, Conclusion, Highlight (4 to 5 points) and References (no more than 30).
